## ENGLISH AUSTRALIA ANNOUNCES NEW CHAIR AND DEPUTY CHAIR

Ms Wallis said "The current batch of regulatory changes combined with the other factors affecting the international education industry will impact particularly on the English language sector with its totally international student base. The challenge for English Australia now will be to assist member colleges to successfully negotiate their way through this next period of change."

Mr Weedon-Newstead said "These are testing times for ELICOS sector which is 100% reliant on international students. Declining enrolments have impacted on revenues and jobs across public and private providers of English courses."

English Australia is currently focused on working collaboratively with the commonwealth government to roll out the reforms of the Knight Review and the Baird Review and to position the industry strongly for future sustainable growth.
